Forward with Heart

Advancing Cardiac Care at Methodist Hospital

Omaha's Ed Finan knows the value of leadingedge cardiovascular care. He just didn't think he would need it.

"I considered myself very healthy. You're working out. You try to eat right," Ed said.

But last year, there came a point when he knew something was off. His heart rate would skyrocket during exercise—and it would remain elevated long after he stopped. Plus, he felt more fatigued than usual. The culprit: atrial fibrillation (Afib), an irregular heartbeat.

"I think it's really important for people to know that Afib is serious and that it can happen to anybody," said Ed's wife, Anne. "I definitely had some scary thoughts about it because of so many things that can happen with Afib."

After consulting with his care team at Methodist Hospital, Ed decided to move forward with a cardiac ablation. The procedure resolved his Afib.

"The care we received was phenomenal," Ed said. "It's great to be able to pay it forward."

The Finans are among those generously supporting the creation of a new cardiovascular education center and simulation lab at Methodist Hospital. This investment in innovation is designed to get cardiovascular patients back to their homes, their families—and their lives—as quickly as possible.

"This project is so important to Methodist for so many reasons," said Josie Abboud, president and CEO of Methodist Hospital and Methodist Women's Hospital

It will lead to enhanced training for staff as well as comprehensive education for patients and families, allowing them to feel more confident and prepared leaving the hospital. Optimally, that will lead to shorter hospital stays and fewer readmissions.

"We have new approaches to medicine, so we need to have new approaches to educating our patients," said Carrie Phillips, service executive of Methodist's rapidly growing critical care and cardiovascular service line.

The cardiovascular education center is designed for patients and families to confer with caregivers in a private, non-clinical setting; engage in crucial pre- and post-op education; and use models to practice injections, IV care and other skills that will be necessary after leaving the hospital.

The adjoining simulation lab will be equipped with lifelike Hal S5301 and SUSIE S2000 training simulators. The Al-enhanced robots will allow Methodist caregivers to practice trauma scenarios and medical emergencies onsite, including intubations, tracheotomies and chest tube insertions. The lab also opens new partnership opportunities for rural providers in need of specialized cardiac training.

Staff development nurse Michelle Peacock, MSN, RN, is another strong proponent of simulation.

"Our employees repeatedly give us feedback on how simulation prepared them for real-life scenarios and increased their confidence when working with patients," Peacock said.

Lead staff development nurse Alex Moore, MSN-RN, sees a lot of value for

newly licensed nurses who are now treating patients with more severe, life-

"Literature supports the use of simulation to supplement learning and to support a safe and effective transition to practice," Moore said. "With a simulation lab and dedicated education space, we can positively impact the nurses' skill set, competence, confidence and readiness for complex patient scenarios."

Methodist Hospital Foundation is fundraising for the project. It will be named in honor of Dr. Matthew Latacha, a beloved Methodist cardiologist who

"It was so important to Dr. Latacha to return his patients back to living their lives to the fullest. He was an amazing

physician, personally invested in his patients' success," Abboud said.

Finan was one of Dr. Latacha's patients. He and Anne remember him as extremely knowledgeable-a very good educator—who had a bedside manner that put them at ease.

"When I found out Dr. Latasha was killed, it was heartbreaking," Anne said. "I instantly thought of my interactions with him-from that initial visit to coming out to see me after Ed's procedure, just how kind and patient

"It's a tragic loss," Ed said. His strong recovery is a credit to Dr. Latacha's expertise and a testament to the caregiver's legacy.

"We are very grateful for the service and the care we received," Ed said.

We All Need Champions

Our donors are champions for Nebraska Methodist College-The Josie Harper Campus and its hardworking students.

Your support helps the college in multiple waysfunding scholarships, emergency financial assistance, mobile health clinics and more.

It's good for the college, the individual, our communities and Methodist Health System. We see the positive impact. Alums like Koren Gabriel—and so many others—are making a difference for Methodist patients right now.

Koren saw her NMC education as a way out of poverty for her and her two children. She juggled single parenting, classes and part-time work. Her drive earned her The Jerry and Tim Scholarship and other awards.

"With all of the things that are in my way, I still did it," Koren said. "Not one person can take that from me."

A 2023 graduate, Koren is now working as a nurse at Methodist Hospital.

Methodist Hospital Foundation will support health care education with just over \$5 million in funding this year. More than \$3.4 million is earmarked for scholarships, including NMC's first full-tuition scholarship. Awarded through the Scott Scholars Program, it has benefitted 11 students since 2021. Cousins Mu Hei Thaw and Paw Ka Pru Htoo were among the 2022 recipients.

"Being given this support and opportunity allows me to pursue my dream of becoming an international traveling nurse," Mu said.

The cousins will spend part of the summer in their native Thailand, serving at a refugee camp and shadowing at a local hospital. Enrichment funds, attached to the scholarship, made the experience possible.

The Scott Scholars Program continues to grow. This year, we had a record 65 applicants.







Donor Advised Funds How Do Those Work?

Contributing to a cause you're passionate about shouldn't be complicated. A donor-advised fund (DAF) may be a way to simplify your giving to Methodist Hospital Foundation and other charitable organizations.

Think of a DAF as a charitable investment account with the sole purpose of supporting your philanthropic goals.

- · Contribute assets like cash, securities and non-publicly traded assets to your DAF.
- · Recommend grants from the fund to your favorite charities.
- Watch your account balance continue to grow tax-free over time.

Why would someone use a DAF instead of making a gift directly

Contributing to a DAF allows you to receive an immediate tax deduction, even if you don't recommend grants to charities right away. This can be helpful if you have a large sum of money you want to donate but aren't sure yet how to allocate it.

If you donate to multiple charities, a DAF could also make tax receipting much simpler. You receive a tax benefit for the donations to the DAF (one account) versus managing all of the receipts from the organizations.

How can a DAF help me build a philanthropic legacy?

Naming your children as DAF advisors or successor advisors can be a great way to teach them about your philanthropic values and the importance of giving back.

Beyond that, you can name your DAF as a beneficiary of your will or estate. This will ensure that your remaining assets are used to support the causes you care about after you're gone.

Do DAFs have restrictions? Is my contribution revocable?

Contributions to a DAF are irrevocableeven though you, the donor, maintain the right to direct those funds. Grants must go to a public 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization recognized by the IRS. No grants to individuals are allowed.

How do I set up a DAF?

If you work with a financial advisor, use them as a starting point. Most financial services have charitable arms for DAF accounts. Be sure to ask about any administrative and investment fees. Omaha Community Foundation is also an excellent resource to find information on DAFs and how to make a local impact with your giving.
